Newspapers often have obituaries or death notices so if you have a date of death, it is worth checking the local newspapers in the days after the death for any announcements. A death announcement will usually give details of funeral services and interments and often other family member names.



Burial Records

The Local and Family History Library holds a variety of burial records including municipal cemetery registers, church burial records and cemetery maps. If we do not hold the records here we will try to direct you to the most appropriate source to locate the information you require.







Cemetery Records

The Local and Family History Library holds microfilmed copies of the records for municipal cemeteries in Leeds. These list burials by date and usually give the name, address and age of the deceased, along with plot details. Printed name indexes are available for Woodhouse, Beckett Street and Hunslet Cemeteries.

The Yorkshire Indexers have also indexed many municipal cemeteries online – see www.yorkshireburials.uk.

Leeds City Council's Bereavement Services keep the original records at Farnley Hall, Hall Lane, Leeds, LS12 5HA, 0113 3957446 or parks@leeds.gov.uk.

Woodhouse Cemetery

This burial ground, also known as Leeds General Cemetery, has been largely cleared of headstones but still exists within the grounds of the University of Leeds. The original burial records can be searched online at:

Beckett Street Cemetery Records

This is the second oldest municipal cemetery in Leeds (Hunslet cemetery opened in January 1845, some eight months before Beckett Street); we have a printed list of burials, indexed by surname and split into consecrated and unconsecrated sections. The index provides burial and grave numbers that can be used to find further details from our microfiche records and a map of grave locations. If you plan on visiting the cemetery yourself you may find it useful to contact the Friends of Beckett Street Cemetery for advice: www.beckettstreetcemetery.org.uk

Parish Burial Records

Church burials are included with our parish register collection on microform. Our website lists which churches we cover. Many of these are available on Ancestry.com which is free to use in all Leeds Libraries – search for **West Yorkshire Parish Registers**.

Killingbeck Cemetery in East Leeds is the main Catholic burial ground. The records are indexed on YorkshireBurials.uk.
