

Divorce records (continued)

The **Central Family Court** in London holds copies of divorce records from 1858. To apply for a search for a Decree Absolute from 1858 onwards you will need to fill in a D440 form here: www.gov.uk/copy-decree-absolute-final-order

Alternatively if you know the year you can contact the court where the divorce took place, fees will apply.

The **National Archives** has divorce case files from 1858-1937. View their catalogue to search by surname here: <https://www.nationalarchives.gov.uk/help-with-your-research/research-guides/divorce/>

A word of warning: Very few divorce case files survive after 1938. Files are now destroyed 20 years after the divorce but you can still apply to the local court for permission to see the file if it still exists.

Wills & Divorce

Wills and Divorce Records

The Local and Family History Library does not keep records of divorces or copies of wills, but we have access to some online records via Ancestry.com.

Locating Wills and Administrations

Whilst the Local and Family History Library does not have any original documents, we do have access to some indexes online:

The National Probate Calendar (Index of Wills and Administrations 1858-1966) is available online via Ancestry.com (free to access in all Leeds libraries). This contains summaries of the vast majority of probate cases in England and Wales 1858-1966. It effectively forms an index to wills and probate records for this period. The records were created by the Probate Registry, which took control of proving wills and administrations in 1858. Before this, four different types of ecclesiastical (church) courts dealt with these cases. A Principal Probate Registry was established in London in January 1858, and several district probate registries were created around the country. From then on, the registries oversaw all grants of probate and letters of administration. This collection is the Calendar of these grants.

UK Extracted Probate Records, 1269-1975, is also available on Ancestry.com. This database is a collection of historical probate records from the United Kingdom. The records in this collection can range in date from the late 13th century to the late 20th century. The records include wills and other miscellaneous types of probate records. Currently no Yorkshire records are included.

The **National Wills Index** (pre-1858) is available on the Find My Past website (which requires a subscription to access). This is the largest online resource for pre-1858 English probate records and contains indexes, abstracts and source documents.

Yorkshire Wills pre-1858: The **Borthwick Institute's** probate archive (wills, inventories and associated records) is England's largest outside London. Records span the period from the 14th century until January 1858, when the business of granting probate was removed from the Church of England to a new civil probate court.

Purchasing Wills and Administrations

Wills and Administrations are kept at the Probate Department in London but copies can only be ordered online or by post.

If the person died in or after 1858 an online search can be made and the will purchased online for £10:

Divorce Records

As with Wills, the Local and Family History Library does not hold copies of divorce records. However there is an index online via Ancestry.com entitled **UK Civil Divorce Records 1858-1911**. These records can contain petitions, certificates and copies of the Decree Nisi and Decree Absolute. The Decree Absolute gives the names of the petitioner, respondent and the place and date of the marriage.

Before 1857 the only legal way of obtaining a divorce was by a private Act of Parliament; however, this was costly and relatively rare.
